JCSTS Announces New Initiative—**CONNECTING GRACE**

Program Teaches Faith Communities to Assist the Formerly Incarcerated

Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary is pleased to announce a new program initiative entitled Connecting Grace. Launched in partnership with the Philadelphia Leadership Foundation, Connecting Grace teaches faith communities to be agents of healing for families affected by crime and incarceration.

The U.S. today with only five percent of the world's population has 25 percent of the world's prisoners. These incarceration rates exact a high toll on our nation's productivity. When these citizens are released from prison and return home, the pressures associated with their reintegration can be overwhelming to our most fragile neighborhoods and towns. Faith communities can be instrumental in easing these pressures by providing safe spaces to conduct the arduous work of reconciliation and reentry. This initiative equips

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communities to support families dealing with issues of stigma and shame associated with violence; foster nurturing relationships with the incarcerated; build a non-judgmental culture of forgiveness and reconciliation; and help reduce the risk of recidivism by assisting returning citizens to build productive lives.

James H. Costen, Jr. (pictured right), is the Connecting Grace Program Director. James has an academic background in Urban Studies. His research focus is on the readiness of the Church to effectively assist the formerly incarcerated in community reintegration. The Connecting Grace Initiative is a five-part training series deliverable as a one-day seminar or two-day retreat. The cost of the training for congregations is \$500 plus curriculum fees and expenses.



Inaugural Certificate in Worship Leadership Now Underway

Registration for Next Cohort (Fall 2017)

Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary's certificate in worship leadership kicked off October 2016 with a capacity class of learners. The program invites students to think theologically about worship and justice and to identify strategies for creating more equitable and inclusive worshipping communities. Instructional partners for the year-long program include Alisha Lola Jones, Ph.D., Professor of Ethnomusicology at Indiana University; Anthony Leach, Ph.D., Professor of Music Education at Penn State University; Eric Wall, M.A., Dean of the Chapel at Austin Theological Seminary; Joshua Lazard, M.A., Minister for Student Engagement at Duke Divinity School; and Floretta Watkins, D.Min., Pastor of Seigle Avenue Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, NC. The Program Director is JCSTS staffer Tony McNeill, D.W.S. The cost to enroll in the next program cycle is \$1,500.

Scholar Willie Jennings Headlines Conference on Origin of Race
