Clergy Wellness Cohort Convenes in the Nation's Capital

JCSTS, in partnership with the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, brought 26 clergy together October 9-12 in Washington D.C., to begin a yearlong certificate course aimed at addressing the high rates of burnout experienced by clergy and other church leaders. The program engages emerging, mid-career, and end-of-career clergy by gathering them into cohorts for health education, leadership education, financial literacy, mutual accountability, and fellowship. Based on the premise that a "well leader makes for a well community/congregation," the program invites learners into a comprehensive review of social, economic, environmental, cultural and emotional wellness.
